Beach Day & Hearing Aids Cochlear Implants

THE WORST THINGS FOR HEARING AIDS OR CI PROCESSORS AT THE BEACH:



Moisture: Hearing aids have electronic components that can be damaged by a lot of moisture - from a lake or ocean *and* from your own sweat.



Sand: sand gets everywhere no matter how hard you try to keep it out. If too much gets into sensitive parts of your hearing aids, it could cause a clog.



Heat: makes people sweat and can also damage hearing aids by overheating electronic components.

PROTECT YOUR HEARING AIDS OR CI PROCESSORS AT THE BEACH!

Before you go:

- 1. Use a dehumidifier on them the night before to remove any moisture in the tubes.
- 2. Bring a protective storage case and some simple cleaning supplies in your beach bag microfiber towel and brush

At the Beach:

- 1. A wide-brimmed hat can protect your hearing aids from wind-blown sand and heat from direct sunlight.
- 2. A sweatband will keep sweat from getting into your hearing aids.
- 3. If you take your hearing aids out, be sure to put them in the protective case or a sealed container.

After the Beach:

- 1. Clean your hearing aids after any trip to the beach.
 - a. Wipe the surfaces with a soft cloth or brush
 - b. Clear out the tubes, and use an overnight dehumidifier to remove built-up moisture.
- 2. Notice any serious blockages or any other issues? Contact your audiologist!
